Focus on three key areas to help your child stay safer:

- Viewing
- Sharing
- Socialising

It's easy to get distracted by the negative, especially if there are apps or sites in the news.

When faced with a new app or platform, remind them to consider and talk about the following three areas:

- the content they can view
- the things they can share
- the people they can talk to

Is my child ready for social media?

- **Is your child ready?**
- The age of your child as well as their developmental stage and maturity can affect their ability to have a safe and positive experience of social media
- **Minimum age requirements**
- Most of the popular social media services require users to be at least 13 years of age before they can register, although some sites are created especially for children under 13 (see Internet Matters' [Social networks made for children](#)).

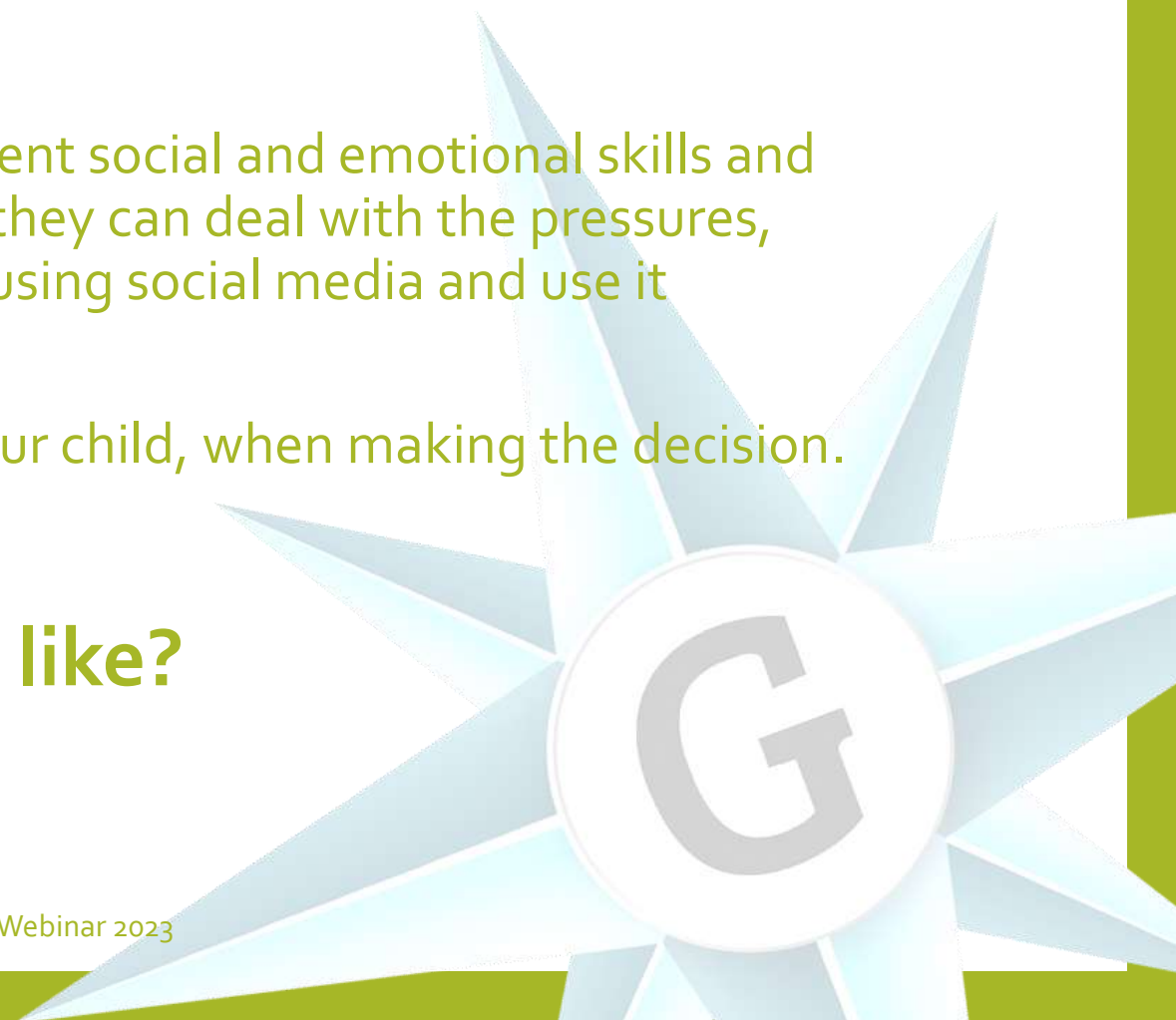

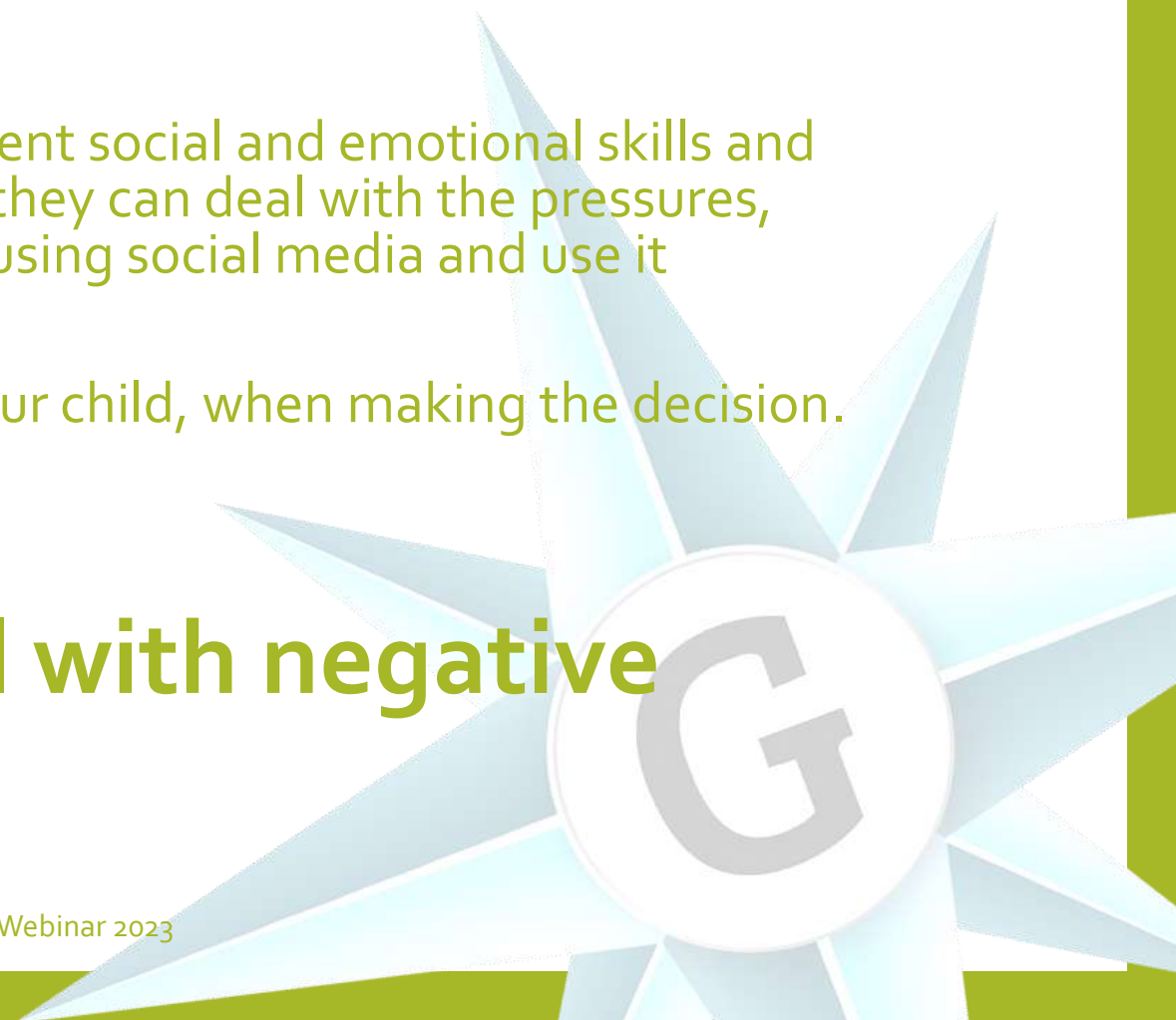
- **Development and maturity**

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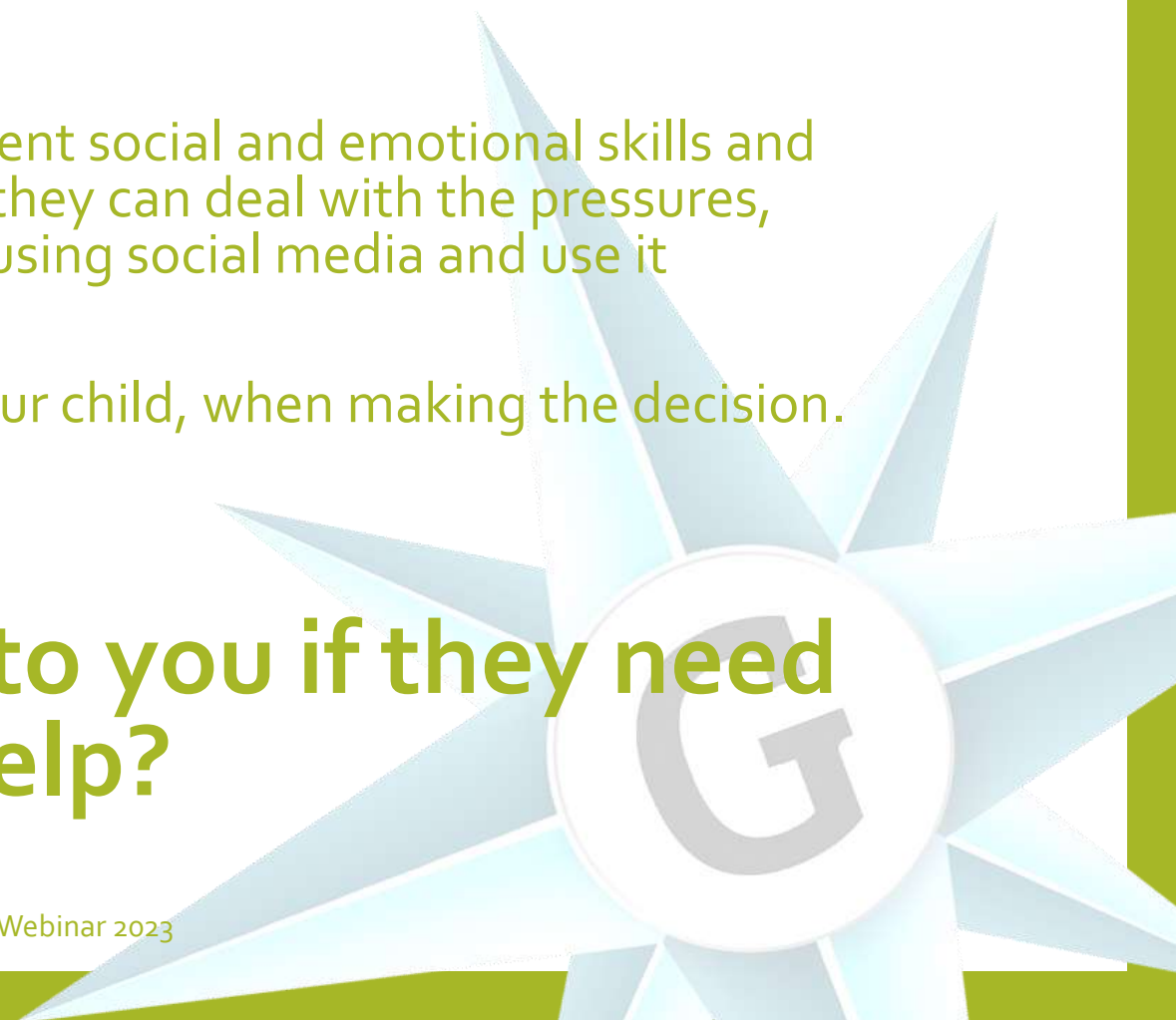

Having 'The Chat'

Having the chat:

conversation starters for talking to your children about online safety



Primary age

- 'How does this game/app work? Can I play?'
- 'Which apps or games are you into at the moment?'
- 'Do you have any online friends?'
- 'Do you know where to go for help?'
- 'Have you ever seen any bad behaviour online? What did you see? What did you do about it?'
- 'Do you know where to go for help if something upsets you online?' (remind them of you, or CEOP, or Childline, or a teacher)
- 'What kinds of things should we do to keep our personal information safe when we're online?'
- 'What happens to what we say or send when we post it online?'

Secondary age

- 'What apps/games is everyone using at your school? What's the social media app of the moment?'
- 'Have you ever seen anyone scamming or tricking people online? What did you see/hear about?'
- 'How do you know that what you're reading about is truthful or fake? What steps do you take to make sure you're not reposting fake stories?'
- 'Do you know your limits?' (You can talk about screen addiction, getting enough sleep, the endless scroll of social media)
- 'I heard about a girl getting tricked into sending nude selfies and then someone shared them without permission. I thought it was really sad. Have you ever heard about that sort of thing?'
- 'How do you know the person you're chatting to online is who they say they are?'
- 'Do you think you could tell if someone was scamming/catfishing you? How?'
- 'Should we treat people differently online than in the real world? How?'

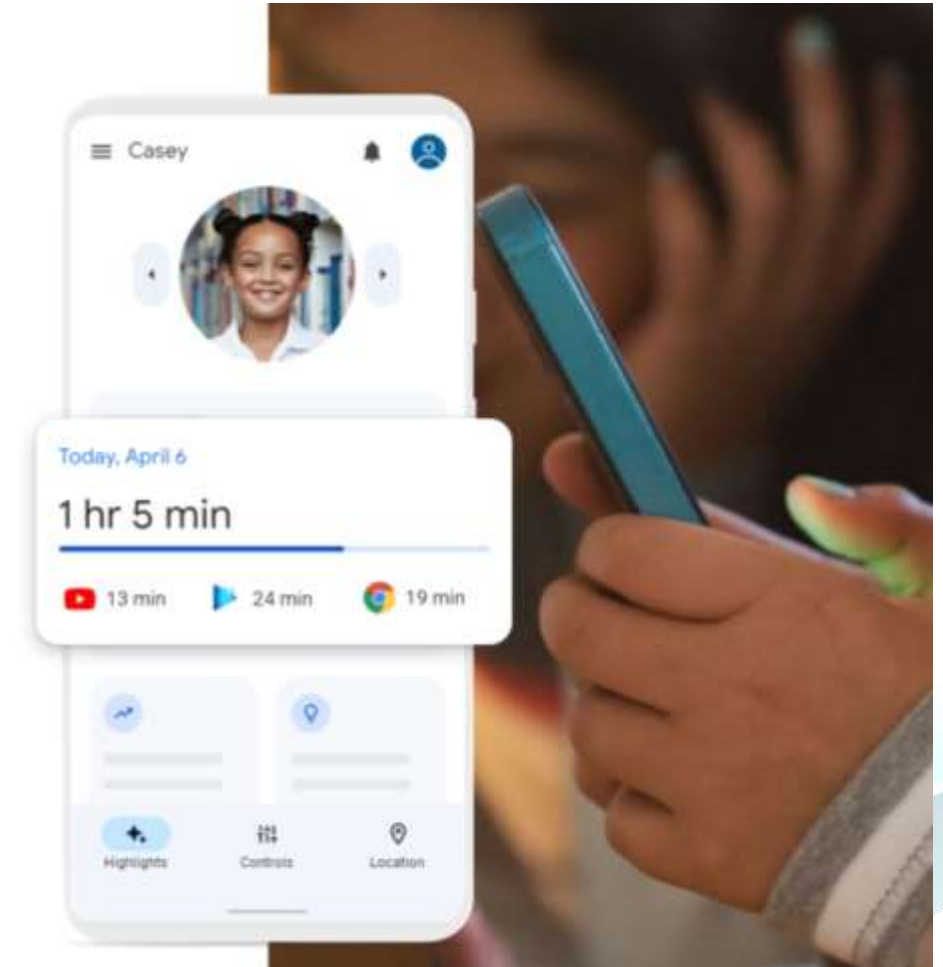
With Family Link, you decide what's best for your family. Easy to use tools allow you to understand how your child is spending time on their device, share location, manage privacy settings, and more.*

Establish digital ground rules

Set screen time limits

Find the screen time that works best for your child. Family Link lets you set downtime for their device and time limits for apps, so you can help your child find a healthy balance.

Staying safe online: Whatsapp

WhatsApp says the minimum age of use is 16, however younger children can easily use this app.

What are the risks?

- There's a risk of bullying, particularly in group chats
- There's a risk of seeing content of a sexual nature, or showing violence and hatred
- There's a threat to safety if your child shares their location, particularly with people they don't know in person
- They may receive spam or fake messages
- In group chats, any users who aren't in your child's contacts can see messages they post in the group, and your child will be able to see messages they post

Remind your child to talk to you about the things they have seen online, and try to remain calm and reassuring - one of the main reasons children will be reluctant to report online incidents is a fear of 'getting into trouble'.

Remember, if you have concerns about the content your child has seen online, you can report it to one of CEOP's child protection advisors: www.ceop.gov.uk

As with all online activities, we recommend the SMART approach

Secret: Do not share personal information about yourself on WhatsApp, such as sharing your location or passwords.

Sharing: Do not arrange to meet anyone from WhatsApp.

Accepting: Only open WhatsApp links from people you know.

Reliable: Know that not everything you see on WhatsApp is trustworthy or true.

Tell: Report anything you see on WhatsApp that makes you feel uncomfortable.

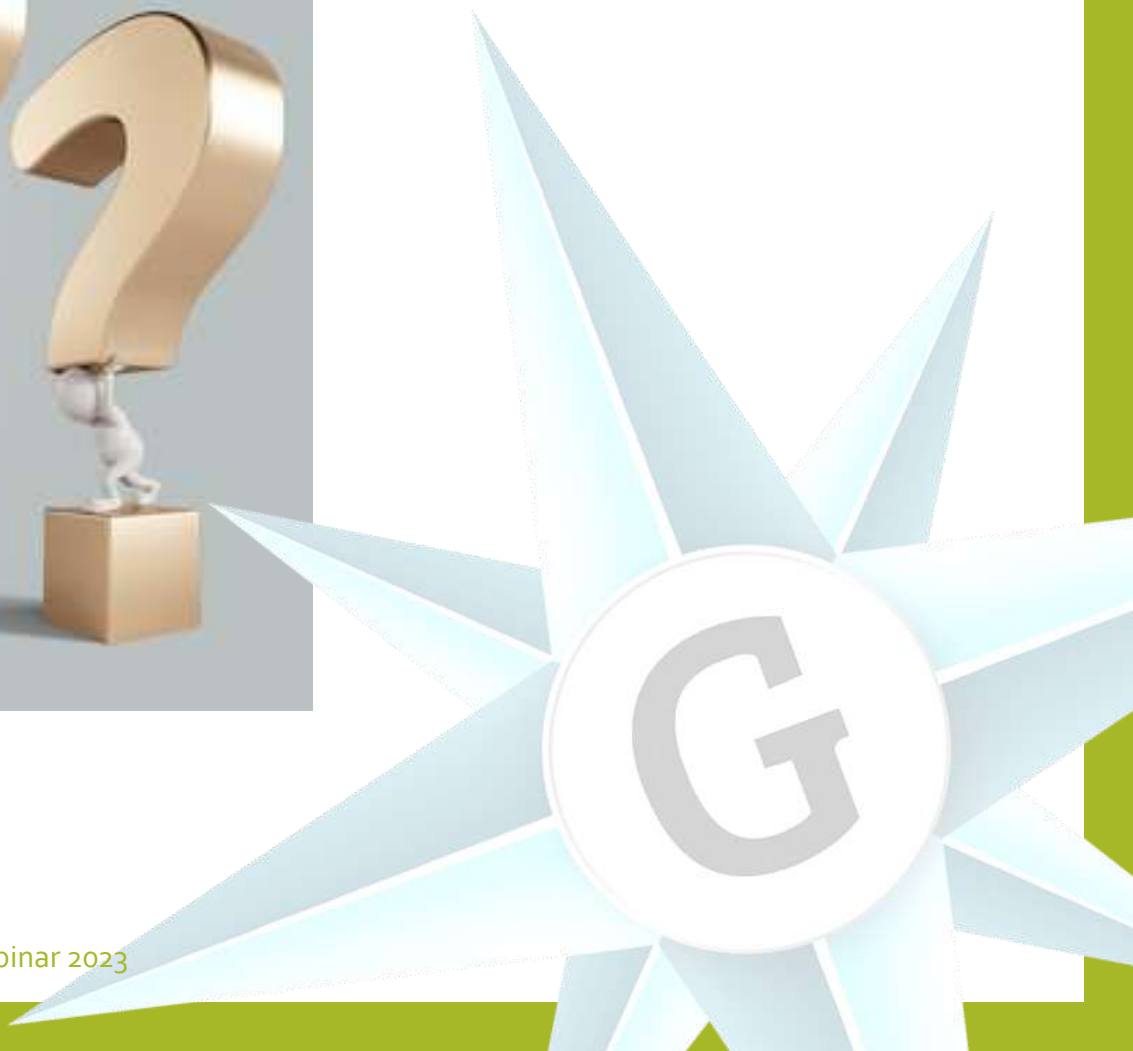
