TikTok



TikTok is an app which can be downloaded onto a phone which enables users to create video content. The app was originally designed for users to mime to songs they like whilst recording themselves. Since then the app has evolved to contain a much broader range of content, some of which can be highly inappropriate. The app allows anyone to contact users via private message without the need to accept them as a friend. This of course can cause many safeguarding related issues.

Tik Tok have recently released a range of parental controls that we strongly recommend you use, if your child is using the Tik Tok app. New features include the ability to change the youngster's settings remotely to block them from carrying out searches, and to prevent strangers from seeing their posts. What are we doing at Glebe to protect young people?

Educating young people about E-safety is something that we take very seriously at Glebe. E-safety is taught across all key stages and students are constantly involved in new and interesting ways of learning about E-safety and supporting their peers with that knowledge too.

An example of this is the annual e-safety video that year 8 students create, designed to teach others about their newfound knowledge around internet safety. The video is available to view on the school website and it was also shown in assembly as part of Safer Internet Day 2019. The E-safety tab on our website is regularly updated and we aim to make this an easily accessible resource for carers and parents for all the latest E-safety related information.

At Glebe we also have sophisticated web filters provided by the LGFL, which prevent children accessing inappropriate websites.

Pastoral Care

Students who attend Glebe know that there is a network of support if they have issues in school or at home relating to E-safety. There is always an adult who children can talk to and safeguarding is of the utmost importance.

For those pupils who don't feel confident enough to talk to someone online we educate pupils about useful websites such as **CEOP Online** and **Childline**, who offer confidential advice and reporting methods for young people at risk.
