College Application Process...



Annual Review: Ideally this is an in-person meeting booked through school cloud. Find which qualifications are being worked towards and at what level. Updated SaLT and OT provision and reports will be attached to the EHCPlan. Colleges use this information to ascertain if they can "meet need", so it's important it is an accurate reflection!



Explore Options: Use information from the annual review to explore appropriate colleges, such as those in this presentation. Attend open days (even before the AR)! Once decided, let the EHCP coordinator know. Applications to mainstream courses can be done directly.





Consultation: EHCP Caseworkers send applications to colleges for consultation. They use the updated paperwork to ascertain whether they can "meet need" and accept or reject the application. **You can apply to more than one college.** If your preference is out of borough, or a specialist provision, you will be asked to discuss whether the price of the provision is justified.



Interview: Most colleges will ask to meet students to discuss appropriate courses. This is why practicing interview skills are important! Colleges may also invite students for "open days" or "transition days".



Enroll: Courses start in the Autumn. Students will have a few days of admin – receiving college passes and completing initial assessments.

Terminology

Colleges refer to SEN provision using different terminology:

- Foundation learning
- Assisted learning support
- Supported learning

With an EHCP, students are entitled to support even on a mainstream course.

Accreditation / regulated qualifications are those which are nationally recognised and will go on to support employment on a CV.

Functional maths and English are academic qualifications based in real-life contexts. All colleges support English and Maths learning and progression but it is worth asking to what extent as not all SEN provisions run accredited courses above a certain level.

Understanding Course Entry Requirements

- Entry Level 1-3 qualifications: Provide access to level 1 qualifications and employment. This is usually the first step if you don't have GCSEs or formal qualifications.
- Level 1 qualifications: Provide access to level 2 qualifications, apprenticeships and employment. Courses at this level provide an introduction to the vocational area and help you to build core skills, knowledge & confidence. Entry requirements are usually EL3 English & Maths and/or GCSE 1-3.
- Level 2 qualifications: Provide access to level 3
 qualifications, apprenticeships and employment.
 Qualifications include GCSEs, Vocational qualifications and apprenticeships. Entry requirements are usually GCSE 4-9 or Level 1 qualifications in the subject.

Each College has individual entry requirements but tend to follow this route of entry. When visiting colleges ensure you ask the entry requirements for the courses you are interested in. To ensure progression, aim for a course the next level up from current qualification attainment level.





Glebe's Sixth Form

Appropriate for more socially vulnerable students who are not yet achieving Entry Level 3 in English and Maths.

Application forms will be sent to all Glebe Y11 students around October half term. Application deadline is in December. Places will be confirmed by February half term.

Places are offered based on a holistic approach involving Head of Provision, Head of Year 11, Pastoral team, form tutors, subject teachers, transition co-ordinator, and academic attainment.

All students work towards:

- BTEC Introductory Level 1 in Vocational Studies
- Functional Skills English from EL1 to Level 1
- Functional Skills Maths from EL1 to Level 1


All option lessons also work towards accredited qualifications, such as Arts Award, King's Trust, BTECs and NCFE qualifications.

LSEC Nido Volans

Where appropriate, students continue to study English, Maths and ICT qualifications.

Application form can be completed in school.

Most of these courses have entry requirements and none lead to accredited qualifications.

- •practical course with real working experience in restaurant and kitchens

Culinary Skills Diploma – Level 2

- •for learners coming straight from school who wish to seek a career in this industry, those with some basic skills and experience as a chef, or those who have experience of working in a commercial kitchen, in a role where you work under supervision.
- •course combines practical based examinations with units covering topics such as the preparation and cooking of meat, poultry and fish, hot and cold sauces, vegetable dishes and desserts

General Patisseries & Confectionary – Level 2

- •focussing on the skills required around the patisserie and confectionary side of things this qualification is intended for pâtissiers, pastry cooks and other professional catering staff

Skills are taught through a wide range of practical activities within our training kitchens, the hot and cold desserts, breads and cakes you produce will be sold in our student led BR6 Bakehouse and Restaurant.

No courses require formal qualification but are pitched at pre-entry level, and Entry 3/Level 1 and are all discussed at interview

Entry Requirements

After completing initial assessments and interviews, learners are placed on to one of four progressive stages. The stages are linked to the learner's independence skills, communication and readiness to work.

EXPLORER

Students explore college life at Croydon College and its surroundings

LIFE, CARERS, AND ENTERRISE

Offering community access, career exploration, work experience, and participation in enterprise

ENTERING A VOCATION

Designed to help students enter employment and study in a tailored programme

SUPPORTED INTERNSHIP

Providing work placements and guiding students into employment

Key topics include English and Maths, work experience, independent travel training, money management, communication skills, and personal presentation.

Croydon Pathways @ Coulsdon College

For students with complex and sever learning difficulties. Students receive 1-2 years with progression into wider college

At the Pathway Centre, the focus is on developing vocational skills, including numeracy and literacy, arts and music. Where suitable, the course offers opportunities for mainstream integration with a focus on social interaction and development of life skills.

All college students have access to specialist Dyslexia Support, Speech, Language and Communication, Emotional Wellbeing, and Occupational Therapy as required.

Capel Manor Pathways

For all foundation learning programmes, students should have Entry Level 2 in Functional Skills English and Maths

The aim of programmes are to nurture personal, social and employability skills. Students participate in diverse class-based and practical activities, gaining exposure to the land-based industry and earning necessary qualifications in maths and English.



The King's Trust and Land Based Studies

- Entry Level 3 Certificate in Progression Gateway Qualifications Limited
- Entry Level 3 King's Trust Certificate in Personal Development and Employability Skills

<u>Hadlow College</u>

Students need at least Entry Level 3 in English and Maths although readiness for the courses will be assessed during admissions process and so there is some discretion

All applicants should have a keen interest in and be commitment to the subject. Ideally they should have both academic and extra-curricular experience of the subject
